GCSE Fine Art What to expect on this course?

Students have 2 taught lessons per week and are expected to complete regular homework to enable them to meet the course requirements and deadlines set for both coursework and exam.

Staff are available lunchtimes and afterschool to offer support with work and enable students to access materials and equipment.

There is an essential requirement of this course for students to complete written work in the form of annotation and analysing their own work and the work of others.





What to expect on this course?

Students are given the opportunity to work in a range of media including; drawing, painting, sculpture, printmaking and mixed media.

There are two assessed components to the course:

- 1. A **PORTFOLIO** (coursework) which shows explicit coverage of the four assessment objectives. It must include a sustained project evidencing the journey from initial engagement to the realisation of intentions and a selection of further work undertaken during the student's course of study. (60%)
- 2. An **EXTERNALLY SET ASSIGNMENT** (10 hour exam) Students respond to their chosen starting point from an externally set assignment paper relating to their subject title, evidencing coverage of all four assessment objectives. (40%)

Assessment objective 1.

Artist research is a key skill in GCSE ART.


The way you organise and present your work and articulate your own opinions can help you develop ideas and learn new techniques.

Assessment objective

This involves being able to experiment with different art materials and techniques and developing your own ideas. These can be in 2 or 3D. You can also use ICT to help develop ideas.

PAINTING FROM ICT
















What to expect on this course?



Assessment objective 3

This involves producing **DETAILED, ACCURATE observational** studies in a range of media of relevant images. These relate to an area of personal interest within the theme.

The studies are often annotated with information about the subject and also your personal response to the how the piece looks and the process(es) you used.





What to expect on this course?

Assessment objective 4:

This involves presenting a personal and meaningful response or final piece that realises your intentions and demonstrates understanding of visual language. Again this could be a painting/mixed media or 3D piece. It could be very large or a series of smaller pieces.
