Learn to apply religion to life.	Sequential Learning Building on prior knowledge of human rights abuses to consider inequalities within the world. Philosophy is also a key strand of religion. Students now need to consider a philosophical problem and consider solutions from both Christianity and Buddhism.	Recap on human rights and fairness and consider whether it is just to deny human right for some.  Evaluation whether capital punishment is fair or a human rights abuse, using religious teachings to support responses.  Consider whether the same ethics should be applied to all of God's creations or just human beings.
