

KS4 Music Curriculum Overview

Music at Oldbury Academy intends for students to develop their performance, composition and analytical skills in music, taking into account the National curriculum. We adapt elements of our programmes of study to take account of our local context including the recovery of any previous lost learning, or where students may lack confidence in performing. We believe music will play a part in making a difference to who our students are, and who they will become as they seek to discover their musical identity. The key concepts for music at Oldbury Academy are focused on developing knowledge and skills in key music areas such as the musical elements, genres and instruments as well as developing performance, composition and rehearsal disciplines within lessons. Students are given opportunities to listen to a variety of musical styles and explore a selection of composers and performers that cover a range of styles and genres including film score, urban styles and reggae. We intend for our curriculum to give students the ability, through high-quality teaching and enriched experiences, both in the classroom and beyond, to make a positive contribution to society, both personally and professionally. Parents, teachers and governors have a shared commitment to the skills we want to see developed in our students. Personal development skills such as leadership, organisation, resilience, initiative and communication are also consistently embedded into the learning environment. These skills are enhanced in KS4 when students get the opportunity to complete tasks in particular job roles from the music industry. The music department ensures there are multiple opportunities for students to develop these skills over their time at school with us.

	Component 2 – Musical Skills Development Learning Aim A- Exploring professional and commercial skills for the music industry Learners will explore personal and professional techniques for musicians and how musicians share their music with others. They will learn to use a variety of methods of evidencing processes and outcomes and communicating skills development. Learners will take part in masterclasses and practical sessions on how develop these skills. Learners will have 2 lessons a week.	Students will have completed their component 3 exam by the end of May and following this, they will have completed the course.
